### **Executive Summery**

"The purpose of all higher education is to make man aware of what was and what is; to incite them to probe into what may be. It needs to teach them to understand, to evaluate, to communicate."

Education is a debt due from present to future generations. The great end of education is to discipline rather than to furnish the mind, to train it to use the powers, rather than fill it with the accumulation of others. Pursuing the aim Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Govt. Girls P.G. College Aliganj has completed almost 17 years of its foundation in this historical city of Nawabs. A city that has a personality of its own. It has not like some of our great cities, a past which runs through the tangled histories of Hindu princedom and Muslim invasion; it has seen little even of great Mughals; but it has all the attraction of period picture. A city which is famous for its Ganga Jamuni Culture, its contribution in architecture dance and music, has many institutions of higher education but Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Govt. Girls P.G. College was the first Government college in this city and the third which got accredited by NAAC in 2007. It was established in the institutional women year to augment higher education among women. It was named after Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose the great Indian leader who was a champion of women rights and included women in his Azad Hind Fauj. The college building was formally inaugurated on Oct 3<sup>rd</sup>, 1997 by Sri Atal Behari Vajpai. The college building is constructed over the area of 10886 sq.m. by Lucknow Development Authority(LDA). Initially the college was started with B.A. programme. The Commerce and Science faculties were added to undergraduate programme in 2001 and 2005 respectively.

The institution touched another milestone with the beginning of P.G. classes in Economics in the year 2009. It was followed by P.G. in AIH, Sociology and Home Science in the year 2010 and 2011 respectively. A remarkable initiative was taken by the college in 2013 as IGNOU and UPRTOU courses of distance education were introduced.

Appointment of faculty members is done by UPPSC. The college still lacks research facilities due to several reasons –

• It has the status of '2f' and thus does not have permanent affiliation. Due to this no grant for research is provided by U.G.C.

 Lucknow University does not permit faculty member of associate colleges to register research scholars.

The institution has applied in RUSA for research projects. The extension activities of the college are organized by –

- N.C.C. programme
- N.S.S. programme
- Rangers programme
- Governmental Awareness Cell
- Gender Sensitization Programmes.

Diverse programmes in academics and co-curricular activities in the area of sports – cultural etc. are well synchronized and reinforced through an effective system. Various committees have student representatives. The college campus is completely ragging free. Grievance redressal cell and women cell help student in many ways. Grievance redressal cell solves the problems of students.

The organizational structure is very democratic in nature. The principal works with the help of various committees. The important matters are discussed in meeting and suggestions are incorporated in planning academic or financial strategy. There is a proper feedback system from students from teachers and from parents help in enhancing the quality of education. Annual confidential report of teachers is reviewed by the director, Higher Education.

### The College: An Introduction

Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Govt. Girls' P.G. College was established in the international women year to augment higher education among women. It was named after the great Indian leader Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose who was a Champion of women, rights. The foundation stone of the college was laid by Sri Atal Behari Vajpeyi on 14<sup>th</sup> April 1997. There are many private colleges in the city but this was the first Government College. The college building was formally inaugurated on Oct. 3rd, 1997 by Sri Atal Behari Vajpeyi. The college building is constructed over the land area of 10886 sq.m. by Lucknow Development Authority. Initially the college was started with B.A. programme with strength of 238 students. The commerce and science faculty were added to the undergraduate programme of the college in 2001 and 2005 respectively. The institution touched another milestone with the beginning of P.G. classes in Economics in the year 2009. It was followed by P.G. in A.I.H., Sociology and Home Science in the year 2010 and 2011 respectively. A remarkable initiative was taken by the college in 2013 as IGNOU and R.T.O.U. classes were introduced. It has come a long way since then with the present strength of 2300.

The college is an associated college of Lucknow University and got recognition by the UGC under section 2 (f) in Jan 2002. However the college has not yet been included under section 12 (B) of the UGC for want of permanent affiliation by the University as the college could not fulfill a few conditions laid down by the University, i.e. faculty strength etc. It is located at the heart of the city of the Lucknow which is also the capital city of Uttar Pradesh. The Gomti river which divides Lucknow, erstwhile city of Nawabs, into two zones. Formerly called Oudh or Awadh, Lucknow is now the capital of U.P., a most populous state of India. It is a medieval city that continues to retain the old world charm. It has the population of about 22,10,000 and its distance from Delhi is 507 Km. The college is situated in the trans-Gomti area which covers a big portion of the city and suburban areas. The location of the college has proved a boon for the students who do not stay in the main city but come from far off villages like Bakshi-Ka-Talab, Madiyaon, Kursi, Kakori, Sitapur, Sidhauli etc. Thus the girls from small places form the majority of the college. Most of them have done their schooling from Hindi medium

government schools. They are not exposed to modern technologies and recent career trends. Thus the college plays an important role in transforming the raw crowd into polished ambitious young ladies.

The college is trying hard to provide the education that can shape the integrated and balanced personality of the learners. Apart from the regular classroom the college has literary club, career counseling cell, student grievance cell and National Integration and Communal Harmony Association, Guest lectures, visit to other organizations, community service programmes through N.S.S. and rangers units are organized from time to time. The college has links with UPAAM, Lalit Kala Kendra, Regional Science Center, CSIR labs, Lion's club, Rotary club, Nehru Yuva Kendra, Forest Deptt., Harvy group MEDHA (NGO) etc. as these organizations conducts workshops, lectures etc. for the students. The college aims at providing intellectual, physical, aesthetic, moral and skill values to the learners. The college has experimented with many innovative methods of teaching like group discussion, teaching by meritorious students, mentor system etc. The college is funded and managed by the state Govt. Higher Education Department and has no self financing courses. Fees are charged at very affordable rates as per Govt. rules enabling students from low income group to get access to Higher Education. There is also provision for scholarships for under-privileged students. The college has the policy of fifty percent (50%) reservation for socially disadvantaged students.

The college was accredited by NAAC in the year 2007 and was awarded B grade. Every year the college develops a plan of action for effective implementation of the curriculum to achieve its vision, mission and objectives. The curriculum is revised during the meetings of the bound of students. Many faculty members are part of board of studies. Quality of education imported to the students is monitored by the head of the institution (Principal) with the assistance of many committees, such as Admission committee, IQAC, Examination committee, Proctorial board etc. Remedial measures are incorporated in teaching methodology in the future. The principal in consultation with the members of various committees prepares comprehensive plans for the enhancement of institutional performance at the beginning of an academic session.

The college has adequate in built mechanism which is continually updated to achieve the goal of academic excellence. There is annual system is U.G. courses and semester system in P.G. courses. The college constitutes various committees to ensure transparency in the admission process. Reservation policy is applied strictly as per Govt. rules. The college takes special care to physically challenged students by providing reservation and friendly infrastructure. Financial support to students is given in the form of various scholarships, remedial classes and specimen books etc. Evaluation of under graduate's completely based on external assessment except impractical system where separate marks are given for file preparation etc. In P.G. classes internal assessment is done on the basis of seminars, assignment etc. Central assessment is done in the university by the teachers appointed for the purpose.

To provide extension activities, special weightage at the time of admission is given to outstanding students of sports, N.S.S., N.C.C. and Rangers. There activities also ensure attainment of graduate attributes and development reasoning, communication skill, sense of responsibility towards society. Remedial classes are conducted for slow learners. The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues related to gender, environment etc. through special lectures, group discussions, rallies etc. The library, computer lab, science labs etc. are all aimed at enhancing the knowledge and skills of students to meet global standards. Annual college magazine, cultural fest, workshop, hobby courses help students in developing their creative skill.

The college encourages faculty members to participate in national/international seminars, orientation and refresher courses for the up gradation of knowledge.

The college is aiming at providing maximum possible learning resources for all sections of society particularly the poor and backward sections by optimum utilization of its limited resources.

The vision of the college is not only to teach but also to educate the students with harmonious development of their personality.

### 2). The Mission-

The mission is to translate the institution's vision by organizing activities on various aspects like intellectual, physical, skill enhancement etc.

The name and the logo of the college reflect the characteristics of the college as its aim is to provide knowledge in order to "Liberate us from ignorance" and "Sa Vidya ya Vimuktaye". It is named after 'Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose' who was a champion of women's' right. The college is serving its purpose of empowering women. The college tries to bridge the gap between the privileged and poor section of the society. This being a government institution has the lowest fee and minimum cost of education. The majority of the students come from lower middle class and the poor class as college provides many scholarship facilities to them. It is a newly established college and within a short span of time it earned the reputation for fair examination, considerably good results, good discipline and regular-teaching system.

### 3). The Objective-

The objective of the college is to educate the young minds. In order to achieve an all-round development of student's personality, programs on the following aspects are organized in the college.

- (A) Intellectual development:- The college emphasizes on the intellectual development of the students. We try to achieve this objective trough regular lecture sessions, project work, essay writing, debates, poetry recitation, exhibition, visit to other institutions, guest lectures, literary clubs, work-shops etc.
- (B) Physical Training:- A balance in physical, mental and emotional development is essential for integrated personality. The college provides facilities for games, athletics, yoga and naturopathy. A lecturer in physical education has been appointed. The college organizes sports week and annual sports day to motivate students for participating in sports activities.

### (C) Moral and spiritual development or value based education:-

Keeping in view the importance of values in education the college aims at educating children to become a better human being and good citizen. Many extracurricular activities, guest lectures, celebrating birth days of great leaders, functions on the days of national importance, organizing lecture series on moral education are some of the efforts by the college staff to inculcate values in new generation. The units of N.S.S. and the rangers, yoga programmes organized in collaboration with Nehru Yuva Kendra, Lucknow help in the development of human values, the spirit of nationalism, commitment to the society, general awareness, co-operation and social adjustments, charity and kindness.

### (D) Development of Aesthetic sense:-

The college is full of activities that are helpful in creating and developing aesthetic sense among its students, many cultural programmes, dance, music, painting, creative writing, drawings, rangoli and kalash etc. from a very important aspect of college activities. The students are encouraged to visit 'Lalit Kala Kendra' for expose to the national and international art and painting exhibitions from time to time. Different literary clubs and cultural societies are also functioning in the college to involve students in cultural and literary activities.

### (E) Development of skill and competence-

Development of skill and competence in order to develop practical skill among the students the college has appointed the computer training consultancy to provide practical knowledge of computers. The counseling cell and order clubs organize lectures to emphasize the importance of skill. The department of 'Home Science' organizes programmes on hobby courses and work-shops (learning by doing).

The goals and objectives of college are described in the college prospectus and college magazine. The stakeholders are made aware of this during parent-teacher interaction and student-teacher interactive session.

### Academic-

Along with many guest lectures a number of workshops and seminars are organized to enrich the students academically. The students are given project works in every subject. The remedial classes are made an essential part of teaching learning process. The teachers also attend a number of seminars and refresher courses to keep themselves update in their knowledge and pedagogical skill. The classes are also taught by senior and meritorious students.

### Training-

The practical and demonstrations are the part of learning process. The training of computers and other hobby courses and work-shops is also given from time to time.

### Access to the disadvantaged-

The college has specific goal to provide education to all especially the weaker section of the society. For the college, the total cost of education is very low and evens the low income group people can offered it. The college has funds and scholarship for the economically disadvantaged students. The college adopted methods to motivate and educate academically disadvantaged students such as, teaching by senior meritorious students, group division method etc.

### **Equality**

The college provides equal opportunities to all the students. The socially weaker sections are given adequate reservation to come at par with their other

counterparts. The economically disadvantaged ones are given scholarships and other monetary assistance though student welfare cell. The college has made "College Uniform" compulsory for all the students. There is reservation for handicapped students and their participation in highly appreciated and rewarded by the institution from time to time.

### Value orientation

The college tries to train the students' mind to eschew the bad and to practice the good. Student has to develop thinking power, capacity to appreciate, ability to think, honor the human values and internalize them. For ethics and values, a compulsory subject, "Rashtra Gaurav" has been introduced which has contemporary relevance.

### Self Development

Apart from the class-room teaching a number of group activities are done in the college keeping in view with its goal of total development. The students are motioned to take part in various group activities like cultural activities, sports, club activities etc. They are the members of many cells, committees and clubs that encourage their participation in the general functioning of the college.

### **Ecology and Environment-**

The lectures, seminars and work-shops are organized to create an awareness of environmental problems. The students of N.S.S. every year organize an exhibition on the subject. The officials from forest department are also invited by the college to educate children about the conservation of forest and ecological values. The students planted 2000 plants in the campus.

### Sources of Communication of vision, Mission and objectives-

### 1.1.2 Curricular Development:

The three year U.G./P.G. curriculum is developed by the university as per the U.G.C. recommendations. However, teachers of the college are often invited by the University Curriculum Development/syllabi redesigning.

The revised U.G. and P.G. syllabus as prescribed by Lucknow University is taught. An annual system of curriculum is adopted. For B.A. the college has 11 optional subjects. However, in B.Sc. and B.Com. only three optional subjects or groups are available as yet. Up to 2<sup>nd</sup> year of graduate courses, the student has to opt any three optional subjects, whereas in 3<sup>rd</sup> year, the student has to opt any of the two subjects she had studied in preceding years. The contents of syllabus in each subject has been suitably divided into 3 or 4 units. In exam, the student has to attempt at least one question from each unit.

In P.G. Courses there is a semester system that includes seminar, dissertation and viva. The college develops the plan- of action for effective implementation of the curriculum to achieve its vision, mission and objectives. The principal and the head of each department prepare an academic Calendar. Every teacher draws his/ her own comprehensive teaching plan keeping in mind the ability of students and the resources available, the curriculum is effectively delivered through lectures, demonstration and practical's which is deployed by faculty members. Relevant books are recommended by the teachers to the students along with the prescribed syllabus. Besides class tests, and assignments group discussions, class seminars and interactive sessions are conducted for the students. To ensure further effectiveness of the delivery of the curriculum-Internet facility is available in the college. The quality of education is monitored by the principal IQAC and feed backs. Remedial measures are incorporated as per the needs.

1.1.3 Suggestions are incorporated in the curriculum planning. The faculty members are often invited to attend the meetings regarding changes in curriculum.

The total course content follows a sequence of earliest developments in a subject to latest developments. Each unit has a sequence of facts, concepts, definition, hypothesis, theories laws and application. For analytical ability and mathematical skill, paper on statistics has been included in Economics, Education and Psychology. Latest development in science subjects have been introduced in the syllabi. A full paper on accounting has been included in B.Com syllabus. Relevant experiments have been prescribed for practical courses as to learn the concept of doing. In P.G. Economics course new concept of Econometrics is being included. Support received by the teachers from University/ Institute.

- The college provides facility for library, journals and e-learning to faculty members for effective delivery of curriculum.
- The College purchase new books as per specified syllabus and also subscribes research journals, Yojna etc. Teachers have easy access to the library to enrich and update themselves.
- The grant is provided to the department for the purchase of books.
- The college allows faculty members to attend faculty enhancement, programmes like orientation course, refresher course, short term workshop etc. held at various universities and institute to facilitate productive interaction.
- The teachers of the college attended short term computer training programmes conducted by UPAAM.
- Member are encouraged to publish research articles in journals.
- The college provides duty leave to faculty members to help them to attend national seminars/ workshops/ training programmes.
- The departments also take initiative to organize seminars.
- 1.1.4 The faculty member of dept. of Home Science Dr. Rashmi Bisnoi is one of the members of bond of studies. Dr. Susmita Chandra has contributed in planning the curriculum for P.G. course in Economics. For effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum, following initiatives have been taken up by the college:
  - Training of teachers to use ICT- based pedagogy.

- Integrating hands-on work experience in practical subject.
- Assigning projects to the students.
- Organizing guest lectures by eminent academician, professionals etc.
- Up gradation of study material as per the low syllabus and subscription of journals, magazines etc.
- 1.1.5 The department of Psychology has linkups with some hospitals such as 'Astha' that is a center for geriatric patients; they visit the patient and study their state of mind. Similarly the students of Education and Home Science visit schools and college meant for disabled or differently abled children. Then surveys and reports help them in making them projects. The students of Economics departments visit Giri Institute and some industries to have the operation knowledge of the subject. The students of B. Com. also paid visit to some companies to find out the real account books etc.
- 1.1.6 Dr. Rashmi Bishnoi, Dr. Susmita Chandra and Dr. Anuradha Tiwari has contributed in the planning of curriculum for the departments of Home Science, Economics and Hindi respectively. Almost each department has taken feedback from the students. A report of their suggestions is being send to the concerned departments.
- 1.1.7 The college has no autonomy with respect to development of curriculum.
- 1.1.8 The teachers plan their teaching according to the units given in the syllabus. There is time limit to cover the entire courses unit by unit. The teaching plans are prepared by the teachers for this purpose. The feedback is collected through periodic tests both oral and written.

### 1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 The college is programming in the direction of achieving its goals by planning and framing various activities and some courses for the students.

### Intellectual:-

The college has the tradition of inviting scholars and the masters of different fields for the intellectual upliftment of the students as well as teachers. In the past two years

The institution is running two courses of open universities.

Certified and Diploma Courses – PGDJHC, PGDFM, PGDEA, PGDHRH, PGDVGCC, PGDPM, PGDEA.

Objective – The objective behind there courses is to provide education to the students who are unable to get admission in regular courses because of poor performance or want to continue their studies along with their job. The classes are run by the qualified teachers either in the evening or on Sundays.

### 1.2.2 NA

- 1.2.3 a). If any student who has failed in any one subject, she is eligible for admission to next higher class with the condition that she will have to clear that subject in "Back Paper Exam", organized by the university with-in 3-4 months. Similarly, if the student feels that she can score better in any of the subjects, she can again appear in the "Improvement/ Back paper exam" of that subject.
  - b). Remedial classes are arranged by teachers for slow learners and disadvantaged ones
  - c). At admission / entry level and teacher's observations in the class and class tests distinguish slow and advanced learners. Remedial classes and demonstration by the advanced learners help slow learners to cope with the program.
  - d). Only at the time of admission, at entry level, students from commerce stream can move to B.A. program. Likewise, students who have studied mathematics or economics at 10+2 level can move to B.Com. programme. However, students from Arts and Commerce streams can not get entry in B.Sc. courses.
  - e). Students from other institutions of Lucknow University can seek admission in this college and vice-versa. Similarly, students from other universities can join this

college provided the university approves the application following a perusal of course contents studied by the candidate.

- 1.2.6 To provide this facility to students the college has a centre each of IGNOU and UPRTOU.

### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

- 1.3.1 The curriculum is developed by the university but suggestions are given by subject teaches. Some of the faculty members are also the members of study council. Keeping in mind the goats and objectives, the members of faculty give suggestions.
- 1.3.2 The college is not directly authorized to make any changes in the curriculum but there is a feedback system where students put suggestion in the feedback forms and there suggestion is set to the respective department.
- 1.3.3 On the suggestion of the college the university has introduced papers of Rashtra Gaurav, which is a qualifying paper. It includes general awareness. Climate change, Human right freedom struggle, scientific inventions etc. The college has established women Empowerment Cell, Grievance Rednessal Cell, Environmental Awareness-Club, Proctorial Bond with a sub committee of Anti Ragging etc.

Gender Sensitization- Gender sensitization programmes such as discussions on women safety, women's rights, physical fitness and gender equity are conducted through N.S.S, Women cell and Rangers.

Climatic change - Lectures and seminars are organized to made students aware of this issue A seminar on ' How to save earth, was organized by Economics department.

Environmental Education- Awareness programmes on environmental issues are a regular feature of the college students are given information regarding the concept of world Environment Day, Earth Day, Ozone Day etc.

Human Rights- Human Rights day is celebrated every year. Chairperson women commission UP was invited to deliver lecture. Grievance Redressal cell and Anti Ragging cell is a part of the.

I.C.T- Students are given the knowledge of Computer.

1.3.4 Moral and ethical values- Lectures on moral issues. Speakers from Brahmkumari organization was invited in the college to speak on moral issues. Dr. Vijay Karn, professor, dept. of Sanskrit also enriched the minds of students with his lecture on the doctrine of Geeta.

Yoga classes are regularly conducted to keep students fit spiritually as well as physically.

### Employable and life skills

'Medha' group of a NGO organized computer classes and ensured placement.

The dept. of Home science runs some hobby courses for the students which help them in getting jobs.

Career Options- There is a career counseling cell to suggest student for better career options.

Community Orientation- NCC, NSS, Ranger contribute in community sessions throughout the year. The students from psychology department, Economics department and Home Science conducted many surveys that included social, economic and cultural issues.

- 1.3.5 The College has set up a mechanism to collect feedback from its stakeholders in order to enrich the curriculum. Students, parents and teachers provide feed back and a report of this suggestion is sent to the university.
- **1.3.6** The institution monitors and evaluates the quality of its enrichment programmes through meetings, discussions and feedback.

### 1.4 Feedback System

**1.4.1** Faculty members are nominated as the members of board of studies. The suggestion from feedback is sent to the respective departments.

Although the designing and development of courses is done mainly by members of the board of studies but the college tries that its suggestions should be in incorporated in the curriculum. The faculty members who are also the part of Board of Studies directly contribute in this field. Apart from this Inputs from alumni, students, stakeholders are communicated to the university by faculty members during their formal meetings. Keeping pace with the fast charging needs of the society, the college attempts to regularly introduce. Courses and programmes, and to provide requisite infrastructure rapidly to implement all the courses effectively.

1.4.2 The suggestion and feedback is collected from the students on curriculum and a report on this is sent to the respective departments of the university.

The College get feedback from-

**Student-** A proforma is given to them and is distributed among students through vandom selection/ advanced lectures.

**Alumni-** Alumni meet provides a platform to ex-students to give their valuable suggestion.

**Parents-** They are active participates in almost all the activities of the college. A healthy interaction with parents is facilitated and encouraged. During annual parents- teacher meet they give their valuable suggestions.

**Academic Peers-** The faculty members participate in various programmes lite workshop, lecture, Seminar and they exchange ideas with peer group.

Community- Cultural programmes, social extension activities provide opportunity to interact with the community informal feedback is thus obtained from them.

1.4.3 The two programmes of distance education are introduces in the year 2013-14 run by IGNOU and Rajarshi Tandon University. The objective behind was to help students who could not get admission because of low percentage or students who want to continue their studies with the jobs.

### CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 The college profile is given on the college site more ever at the end of the session college profile, admission process, placement prospects, sports facilities and other features are published in various newspapers such as Nav Bharat Times, Dainik Jagran etc. in order to make students aware of the achievements of the college. Since the students of the college keep on participating in many inter collegiate compellation and awareness programmes like voter awareness, pulse polio, blood donation camp etc. the name of the college is very much known to people. The admission process is fully transparent. The details of each form are filled in computer and the merit decided by the college is also given which any student can find out. The detailed information is provided through prospectus. There is a separate committee formed during admission time for guardian and students who can contact them for any doubt or clarification.

### Transparency-

- 1. A merit list is prepared by the college of all the application so that a student can get information of her place.
- 2. Relevant information regarding fee, scholarship and other infrastructure is given in the prospectus.
- 3. The college verifies all the documents, reservation claims etc. with the help of the committee consisted of faculty members.
- 2.1.2 On the basis of merit (mark obtained in 10+2 level) (ann. Paper cutting) the final merit of the students is decided. Each form is scrutinized personally by the admission committee. Reservation is given as per government rules. Weightage is given to candidates having extra ordinary performance in sports, NCC, culture programmes etc. After the final merit a counseling session is being organized. A candidate is supposed to appear personally and the suggestions are given to her for subject combination keeping in mind the goal of her career by the team of teacher experts.

2.1.3 As per university is norms the percentage required for admission on at entry level is 40% (percent) for U.G. 45% (percent) P.G. But the applications for admission are so many in numbers that the percentage goes much higher than the prescribed norm. The programme wise detail is as follows:-

No direct comparison is possible because different college has been allotted direct number of seats in U.G. and P.G. classes. The college with higher number of seats has low percentage at entry level. There is no system of comparity it with other colleges.

- 2.1.4 There is no separate committee to review the mechanism but every year admission committee before starting new admission review the comparative profile of the students of previous year and the present one and analyses the interest of students in subjects and accordingly decodes the combinations of subjects.

# 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- 2.2.1 There is reservation for differently challenged students. The staff takes special care to the students regarding their seating arrangements, classroom facilities etc. A ramp is also constructed to help such children.
- 2.2.2 The students are motived to get enrolled in various knowledge based programmes like computer courses etc. and skill programmes like hobby courses etc. The institute assesses the student's need in terms of knowledge and skill. At the commencement of the programme following measures are taken-
  - The admission committee hold talks with students regarding their aptitude and help them in the choice of subjects.
  - The admission committee is also refer to the students to subject experts in order to clear their doubts.
- 2.2.3 Remedial classes are arranged by different departments as compulsory part of time table so that the weaker students can cope up with the programme of their choice.
- 2.2.4 The college has established a woman cell. The cell organizes many activities on subjects like gender sensitization, crime against women etc. Seminars, lectures and workshops are organized. There is a student's grievances red resell cell that deals with the different problems at the girls of the girls individual as well as common. It is headed by Dr. Krishna Sharma head dept. of Psychology who provides personal counseling and other help to the students.

There is an environment club in the college under the guidance of Dr. P.S. Mishra – Head dept. of English.

Group discussion on the problems related to woman life female foeticide, dowry, safety, domestic violence are organized and activists from N.G.O's are invited for delivering lectures.

- Poster competitions & awareness rallies are organized by N.S.S. students.
- Under health care programme many doctors are invited and comps for free health checkup were organized.
- N.C.C. and N.S.S. and their coordinators sensitize teaching staff and students on socio-cultural issues.

- 2.2.5 Advanced learners are identified through feedback provided by the teachers through the input that they get from interaction in the classes, through class tests and quiz etc. The institute responds to special education/ lecturing needs of such students by taking the following steps.
  - Extension lectures as per their need.
  - Motivating such students to participate in national level programmes.
  - Organizing test and competitions for scholarship or free courses in the college.
  - NIIT every year conduct on entrance test and give scholarship or free ship to meritorious students.
  - Teachers desist them with coaching classes for competitive exams.
  - They are motivated to participate in inter collegiate competitions.
  - Books and journals and reading material is given by the teachers.
- 2.2.6 The college has the system of proper feedback from the students. The monthly test system, project writer, surprise test are different strategies through which the performance of weaker students is monitored. There is provision for scholarship for economically weaker students is monitored. There is provision for scholarship for economically weaker section. Apart from this a group of teaches also provide financial and other support to the students who are needy. Owning to all these measure the dropout rate of the students is almost negligible.

# 2.3. Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1 The college prepares an academic calendar before the commencement of teaching programme incorporating in schedule various activities including periodic test and annual exams. Teachers chalk out teaching plan for the year. Academic calendar-University has annual exams system in U.G. courses and semester system in P.G. Courses. For both the cases academic calendar is prepared by the University. On its own part college prepares its own academic calendar that includes plan for academic activities, co-curricular activities celebration of the days lift Human Rights Day, women's Day, Earth Day, cultural fest etc. The planning and organization of teaching, learning and evaluation of all the courses of each discipline is done by a committee which consists of the Principal, members of timetable committee, members of the examination committee and head of every department of the college.

- A Time- table committee of the college prepares. Comprehensive time- table for all
  the faculties and allots class rooms as per the requirements of the time table. The
  departmental time-table is made by the faculty member of respective departments.
- The faculty members of every departments prepares teaching plan according to the syllabus within the time limit and leaving scope for project works parishad activities etc.

### **Evaluation Blue Print**

- Assignments/ Seminars also form the part of internal evaluation process.
- In P.G. courses internal assessment and viva is done by the faculty members for viva for final semester is conducted by the University.
- 2.3.2 The IQAC suggested for more audio visual teaching methods. The projector and was provided to improve the teaching learning process. Other than this IQAC contributes by taking following steps.

- 2.3.9 The faculty and students visit library regularly. The reading material such as journals, magazines, newspapers and books and material for competitive exams is provided to the studies. In order to encourage students to visit library various academic activities are organized by the library in charge. Library resources are used to augment teaching-learning process in the following manner.
  - Addition of new books according to the Low syllabus.
  - Subscription of magazines, journals.
  - A reading room with tables, chairs is provided.
  - A copy of syllabus is also made available to students.

- The library staff keeps faculty members and students up dated regarding its latest acquisition.
- The library functions on all working days from 10.00 am to 4.00 pm including summer and winter vocations.
- 2.3.10 The departments run by single member face the challenges in completing the course but it is overcome by taking extra classes. Scarcity of teaching and non-teaching staff and high teacher-student ratio. The staff overloaded.
  - Due to scarcity of lab assistants and technical staff, the college faces acute problems in running practical classes smoothly.
  - Lack of faculty for P.G. classes leads to problems. University has implemented semester system at post graduate level while annual system continues at undergraduate level. To run the semester and annual system concurrently there is a greater need of teachers which is not being catered.
  - Appointments of faculty members are done by UPPSC Allahabad, The colleges has no authority to appoint teacher at temporary basis. However the college invites teachers for guest lectures from other govt. colleges to deliver lectures on specialized areas.
- 2.3.11 The quality of teaching is evaluated through various interactive session with the students, periodic tests, projects etc. Formal feedback from the students helps in monitoring teaching and learning process.

- 2.4.2 Appointment of teachers is the sole right of the government of Uttar Pradesh and it is done through UPPSC.
- 2.4.3 Teaching staff is recruited through public service commission, UP Govt. has initiated recruitment of lectures on contact basis. The career advanced scheme of the UGC involves self-appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programmes. The career advanced scheme has motivated teachers to participate in refresher and orientation course.

The self-appraisal method adopted by UGC has worked successfully to motivate the staff and its performance. The annual confidential report also includes a section on self-appraisal by the faculty. There is a grading system in ACR. The ACR reviewed and graded by the principle and forwarded to the Director, Higher Education for his report there on.

For summative assessment University Conduct the exam. Final result is prepared on the combined basis.

### 2.5.5 Impact on the System-

The Students are shown their results and are advised to improve their performance. The students with good discipline and behavior are awarded. Since the college has they limited scope in evaluation it cannot make any change. Formative assessment ensures regularity in class rooms and day to day performance. It makes them innovative and attentive. The college has very little role to play in evaluation system. It is done by the University. But college assures project work/ files/ assignation is carried out in the final semester.

The entire process is aimed to enhance the confidence of students and to prepare them to face the final exams confidently.

- 4.1.4 There is a ramp constructed for disabled students. The college staff takes due care that such students can comfortably reach the classrooms. Ramp to the first floor is in the pipeline.
- 4.1.5 There's no residential facility. However the college is trying to have at least one hostel for girls as the students come from far off areas and community itself is very difficult.

- i. Dr. Preeti, Associative professor SGPGI Lucknow conducted 5 workshops in the campus and examined 175 students for various hormonal problems. The students who have some 'Cyst' problem were further examined by collecting their blood samples and some of them who needed treatment who called to SGPGI and given free treatment.
- ii. Vasan eye care hospital conducted two days camp and did free eye checkup. The girls with eye problems who required treatment were given free treatment by Vasan Eye Care Hospital.
- 4.1.7 In its limited area it's not possible to provide enough space for all units but the functioning of their units is not handled by this, The in-charge of grievance Redressal unit, Women's cell, Conduct their day by day activities from the departments for the purpose of lectures or workshop the multipurpose hall is used. Similarly career counseling workshops also take place in the multipurpose hall. We have two water coolers with purifier for drinking water. A small canteen is also run by the committee of students. There is no health center but sports room and NSS room both have the facility of first-aid.

The vision and mission of the college is in time with the objectives of higher education policies of the nation as it aims at providing good quality education accessible to all sections of society. Maximum reservation is given to SCSIOBC students in admission. Financial support and scholarships are given to the poor and needy students. The college tries to empower women urban and suburban areas with acknowledge and information required for critical discussion making life and to become a good citizen.

The college tries to translate its vision statement by organizing activities or various aspects like intellectual and physical development, skill development, moral development communal orientation etc. The college provides maximum possible learning resources for all of its students by optimum utilization of its limited resources.

- 6.1.2 This is a state Govt. institution. There is no management body. The Higher education department of the state Govt. is involved for effective and efficient transaction of the teaching learning process.
- 6.1.3 The state Govt. appoints teaching and supporting staff and provides funds for the college. The responsibilities of the staff are defined by the Govt. The Director, Higher Education U.P. Allahabad is head of the Higher Education Departments. The principal is head of the institution to look after the institutions management. The teacher of each subject has to look after the daily-teaching learning work and intimates the Principal about the progress and requirement of the subject/

department. The office staff is custodian of records and look after the routine official work. The librarian manages the library work and reading room.

The principal supervises and monitor the working of the staff and the duties discharged by them.

- 6.1.4 Interaction with the staff, students, visitors, parents provides information that help in managing the institution.
- 6.1.5 No management. The committees along with principal do the work.
- 6.1.6 The principal who is head of the institution encourages teachers and students, ensures their participation in decision making, and listens to the suggestions of people concerned with the welfare of college thus the leadership at the top level functions.

There are many committees in the college headed by faculty members. They work as leaders in organizing that particular activity.

The members of student council, the office bears of different associations and departments also organize activities. Thus the student's ability to work as leaders of a group is also encouraged.

- Associations, Sports club and other such committee are given freedom to organize and conduct things. Although the Principal is overall in charge of all the committee but he advise only when committee approaches him for the same. Many units like N.C.C., N.S.S. independently. Only at the end of the year they present a report to the principal. Thus they enjoy an autonomous status.
- 6.1.8 The college has a culture of participative management. All major decisions are taken through discussions in the meetings. The suggestion of every teacher is taken into consideration and if everyone agues it is implemented also.

# 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment



- c. IQAC has external members on its committee Dr. P.C. Joshi and Dr. Vijay Karna. They made great contribution for enhancing the quality. Dr. Karna organized a camp for Sanskrit learning. Dr. P.C. Joshi helped in establishing linkages with N.G.O.'s and other such bodies.
- d. Students and alumni contribute to effective functioning of IQAC by means of their feedback on teaching-learning and various curricular aspects. Alumni has also helped in organizing classes for students in the absence of teacher.

- 4. The Context-

The college provides education to all including marginalized and weaker sections of society at a very nominal cost or fee. The catchment area of the college is mostly suburban area having poor and backward population and where access to higher education is lacking. The girls who come from conservative families prefer all girls colleges. The institution being a girls college provides a safe environment to the girl students. Moreover the cost of higher education is increasing and the students especially girls do not continue their study after intermediate. The parents prefer to spend money on male child. In this context a kind of free education to girls is a boon for them. Not only this has the college provided scholarships and other financial assistance to the students.

# 5. The Practice-

This is all girls college that caters the need of 2000 girls. There are three faculties for U.G. courses. And many P.G. causes are also taught. There is 50% reservation for weaker sections life SC, ST and OBC students. The scholarship is provided to all SC/ST students and the OBC students who are economically weak.

The training of Karate, hobby courses and other facilities are provided free of cost. Computer training is also given to them at very low cost. The scholarships are given to the poor students of SC,ST, OBC and poor student's Fund. Apart from this, the teachers also bear the cost of education of poor but meritorious children. Some of the alumni students are also being benefited by the efforts of charity. There is a college uniform that brings a sort of equality among girls.

Academically the following practices help to the weaker students to come at par with the other student.

- > Remedial classes are arranged for them.
- We follow group division system in assignments Projects. etc. A group consists of a few bright students and other weaker students.
- Mentor and Mentee system is also very helpful to the students who are academically weak and hesitant to discuss problems with the teacher.

  Since the college caters the students from the lower middle class they are being provided exposure to modern technology, career guidance, and interaction with eminent scholars.

# 6. Evidence of Success

- The opportunity that college has provided to the student has proved to be a turning point in the lives of many of them.
- The students who were unable to afford higher education who given a chance to study.


